

In *Centesimus Annus* Pope John Paul II focused on the nature of man: "Not only is it wrong from the ethical point of view to disregard human nature which is made for freedom, but in practice it is impossible to do so. Where society is so organized as to reduce arbitrarily or even suppress the space in which freedom is legitimately exercised the result is that the life of society becomes progressively disorganized and goes into decline." The great significance of *Centesimus Annus* is that Pope John Paul didn't stop at freedom in his analysis but went on to what is of even greater consequence to man's economic activity: Pope John Paul rooted property rights in work and how work expresses the image of God.

Most recently, Pope Francis in *Evangelii Gaudium* extoled "free and creative work" and went on to affirm that business "is a noble vocation that serves the common good by striving to increase the goods of this world and to make them more accessible to all."

In these statements and in our graduates you will see what the ideal of Central Catholic High School is at its heart: an institution that not only promotes scholarship, but more importantly, trains its students to be sensitive to

and impresses upon them the obligation to lead the kind of reflective life that translates into taking one's social responsibility seriously. Virtues as a work

> ethic, self-discipline, compassion, honesty, and being sensitive to issues of justice and stewardship both define our graduates and a free society.

Thank you to all who have answered the call to serve others through the many professions you belong to, for building strong and free communities in the image of God.

UPFRONT & PERSONAL

n the 1960s Jackie Calmes '72 told her classmates at St. Clement's Catholic School that one day she would be the first woman president. Her dream of the presidency took a slight detour— journalism—a career choice that brought her up front and close to the White House.

Jackie credits her father, who died when she was in the sixth grade, with helping her to dream big. "He always made me feel like there were no barriers to what I could do," she said.

Throughout her 18-year career at the Wall Street Journal and positions as White House correspondent and national correspondent for The New York Times, Jackie has covered three American presidents, travelled to South American, Europe, Asia, China and 47 of the United States, sat through hundreds of White House briefings, travelled on Air Force One, and explained the ups and downs of federal budgets and tax legislation to millions of Americans. In 2005, she was awarded the Gerald R. Ford Journalism Prize for Reporting on the Presidency.

It's a long way from her days of working on the newspaper at Central Catholic. Jackie credits her high school English teacher, Sr. Pat and newspaper advisor, Sr. Susan for encouraging her to join the school newspaper staff. "I still remember the first story I wrote," said Jackie. "It was a profile on the wife of Coach Kregel, the football coach."

"Central Catholic inspired me to do well in college," said Jackie. She earned a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Toledo and a master's degree in journalism from Northwestern University.

"I decided to use my career as a journalist to see places I had never been," she said. Her first professional job took her about as far west as she could go: Abilene, Texas.

"It was a culture shock," she explained. "I had never had the resources to travel to other places. Here I was, an Irish Catholic girl who was used to bowling and bars, in a dry town in Texas with three Christian colleges. Her first story of her professional career was about the city's local election on switching from dry to wet.

A move to Austin to work on the *Dallas Morning News* brought Jackie closer to a topic she came to love—politics. "Each job I had gave me a taste of covering politics," she said. "It's what I gravitated towards."

She moved with her family to Washington, D.C. in 1984, where she worked for *The Wall Street Journal* as the chief political correspondent in the Washington bureau. She joined *The New York*

Times in 2008. Jackie has covered the White House and Congress, George W. Bush's presidential campaign, election reform and politics. She has written about the federal budget throughout much of her career, a topic she said has a tremendous impact on the nation.

"In the 1980s, working on the budget meant covering people like Tip O'Neill, Bob Dole, President Reagan and Howard Baker," she added

While her work includes grueling hours and hundreds of political briefings, one aspect of it still makes her stand in wonder: Air Force One. "I never get tired of seeing Air Force One," she said, comparing it to the American eagle. "It's such a potent symbol of our nation"

Occasionally the President will come back to the Press Cabin on Air Force One and speak off the record with the reporters.

"During one trip to Asia, President Obama came back to the Press Cabin while we were flying over the Pacific and spoke to us for over an hour," said Jackie. "Meeting with him in this capacity is really an intangible experience. You get to see a side of someone that confirms what you think or believe about him."

hen he was 15 years old, Jim Schmakel '69 won a contest to be a batboy for the Toledo Mud Hens. He didn't know it at the time,

but winning that contest would lead to a home run in his career—a job as Clubhouse Manager for the Detroit Tigers.

"I knew I really wanted to go to Central Catholic and I knew I had to pay my way," said Jim, whose sons followed in his footsteps, attending Central Catholic and playing high school tennis like their dad. The batboy position evolved into a clubhouse manager position for the Mud Hens, a job Jim held when he was just a sophomore at Central Catholic.

He continued to work for the Mud Hens through high school and college at The University of Toledo. After graduating from UT, Jim taught and coached at Central Catholic and Woodmore High Schools.


His segue into the Tigers was fortuitous. In 1978, Jim called to congratulate a friend, Pio DiSalvo, who had recently been named equipment manager for the Tigers. Pio had decided he wanted to return to the Triple A League in Evansville and asked Jim if he wanted the job with the Tigers. Jim has now worked for 11 Detroit Tigers managers, including Sparky Anderson, Alan Trammel, Jim Leyland, and the current manager, Brad Asmus.

His list of duties as Clubhouse Manager is exhaustive. He oversees a staff of 12 in the 3,700 hours he works each season. He's responsible for maintenance of the locker room and clubhouse, players' meals, and car and limo rentals.

Every detail is his, from clothing alterations, to dry cleaning, grocery shopping, and helping players find apartments and condominiums.

The job was a little easier in Jim's early career. "I used to haul all of the equipment myself to the airport, including the players' bags," said Jim. "Today we need a 15-foot truck." "We have a lot more people who travel with the team today," he adds. "We bring strength coaches, trainers, massage therapists, public relations people, and videographers with us."

The annual trek to Lakeland, Florida requires two trucks to transport everything needed for spring training. Jim oversees the entire transport and delivery, with an estimated 70,000 pounds of equipment, including more than 9,600 baseballs and 1,300 bats.

Jim has a lifetime of memories as he continues his career with the Tigers. Among his fondest was the final game at Tiger Stadium on September 27, 1999. The final hit of the game was a rooftop grand slam. The postgame ceremonies featured a host of former Tigers, including Al Kaline, Kirk Gibson, and Cecil Fielder. "Another player came running onto the field," said Jim. "When the fans realized it was "The Bird," (Mark Fydrych), the stadium erupted. It was a great night."

The Clubhouse Manager position requires working weekends, holidays, and travelling thousands of miles. If he happens to get frustrated with his job, Jim says he follows a simple routine. "I walk out to the dugout," said Jim. "I look out at the stadium and I remind myself that there are 40,000 people that would love to do what I'm doing."

elissa McGhee '07 likes to plan everything at least six months in advance. It's a habit that has served

her well, especially in her role as The Ohio State University's dance team head coach and her fulltime position at Abercrombie & Fitch in their human resources' leadership development program.

Melissa, who has been dancing since she was two and a half years old, honed her skills while a student as a member of Central Catholic's Irish Dance Team. Her love of dancing followed her to The Ohio State University where she was a member of the dance team for four years. Melissa was voted captain and named its most valuable team member in 2010-11.

Melissa excelled academically as well. She received the Morrill Scholarship Award of Distinction and the Fisher College of Business Pacesetter Award, the university's highest honor presented to the student who exemplifies outstanding scholarship and leadership. In 2011, she was named coach of the OSU Dance Team.

The OSU Dance Team supports athletic events, including all home football and basketball games, performs at community and corporate events and represents the university at the national collegiate dance competition. Its 20 members practice three hours a day at least three days a week.

This past year, The Ohio State University Dance Team placed 2nd in the Division IA Pom Competition at the UDA Collegiate National Championship in Orlando. This is the highest placement The Ohio State Dance Team has finished in the history of the program.

Melissa said she enjoys watching the team members evolve during their time at OSU. "From the time they are freshmen to when they graduate, they accomplish a lot through discipline and time management," said Melissa." They take those same skills into their lives and the workplace."

Melissa said she gained similar skills while a student at Central Catholic, plus a better understanding of community.

"At Central Catholic you get a sense that you are part of a bigger community," she said. "You are immersed with students from so many diverse backgrounds. That really helped to prepare me for college and my career."

sure which career path to take while a student at Central Catholic, but looking back, his ultimate decision now

makes perfect sense. Mitch, who earned three varsity letters while at Central Catholic and earned a full athletic scholarship to the University of Toledo, where he played basketball, is a board-certified orthopedic surgeon in Golden, Colorado. He specializes in sports medicine, with an emphasis on injuries to the shoulder and knee.

Mitch, who led Central Catholic's basketball team in scoring his senior year, said many of the teachers and coaches at the high school had an important impact on his life.

"Mr. Dever was one of my favorite teachers," said Mitch. "He embodied everything that I associate with Central. He was very smart, had a great sense of humor, and treated me like family."

Pete Benedict, who coached Mitch's brothers in football, also had a positive influence on him. "Coach Benedict took my brothers under his wing and that filtered down to me," said Mitch. While a student at the University of Toledo, on a snowy bus drive home from a basketball game with Northern Illinois, the team's physician, Dr. Roland Gandy, a general surgeon, asked Mitch what he was going to do with his life.

When Mitch said he was studying exercise physiology, Dr. Gandy said, "Mitch, why do you just want a piece of the pie when you can have the whole thing?"


Mitch went for the whole thing. He earned his medical degree from the Medical College of Ohio and completed his internship in sports medicine at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School.

"Playing sports throughout my life taught me to manage my time and be persistent," said Mitch. "I came to realize that you don't have to be the smartest to do well; you just have to persevere."

Mitch has served as the former staff physician for the U.S. Women's Ski Team and is the Medical Director of Jefferson County Athletic Trainers and the team physician for Regis University and Columbine High School.

He was named "Top Doc," in the 2005/2006 Denver Magazine.

Whether he's following the career of one of the athletes he treated, like Lindsey Horan of the U.S. women's national soccer team, or helping a high school athlete with a shoulder injury, Mitch said it's easy to feel good about his work. "Every day, you can make someone feel better."

s the senior population continues to grow exponentially, Franciscan Living Communities (FLC), part of the Sylvania Franciscan Health

system, has grown just as quickly. Rick Ryan, '75, President and CEO of FLC, has guided the organization to accommodate the changing needs of today's seniors.

Created in 1998 by the Sisters of St. Francis in Sylvania, FLC is now a leading provider of Catholic elder care in Ohio and Kentucky. Its programs include independent and assisted living, memory care, rehabilitation, skilled nursing, adult day care, and its newest addition, homecare services. FLC now includes more than 1,600 living units ranging from nursing facility beds to independent living cottages

Providing a continuum of care for a population that remains healthier, lives longer and is expected to more than double between now and the year 2050 is no small task.

"Today's seniors are looking for wellness programs, more stimulating and intellectual activities, and larger spaces than their predecessors," said Rick.

To accommodate them, FLC carefully designs its communities to meet the needs of healthy seniors and those needing more advanced care. For example, FLC's newest property, St. Clare Commons, located in Perrysburg on 55 acres, includes 56 assisted living apartments, 36 memory care suites, and 60 skilled nursing/short-term rehabilitation beds. Residents can enjoy a cup of coffee at the on-site Starbucks*, listen to jazz music at the piano lounge, and picnic on the rooftop terrace gardens.

"We design our senior living centers to be like those that we would want to live in with our own families," explained Rick, who received his Masters in Healthcare Administration from the University of Illinois and began working with the Sisters of St. Francis in 1989.


"We research the most innovative best practices and models for advanced care, including dementia care," added Rick. At its St. Leonard community, FLC partnered with the Nursing Institute of West Central Ohio and Wright State University to create a nationally recognized Behavior Based Ergonomics Therapy program. St. Leonard is also the first accredited Vital Life Community in the United States, a process devoted to aging well, extending life, and decreasing the effects of chronic conditions.

"All of our programs and services are designed to respect the dignity of each resident," said Rick.

At the center of all of its advancements and specialty care is one unchanging commitment: the spiritual health of all its residents.

"Each of our organizations includes a chapel, a director of mission integration and director of spiritual care to meet the spiritual needs of all of our residents," said Rick.

For Rick, who said he always knew he wanted to be part of a profession in which he worked with seniors and could put into practice the values he learned at Central Catholic High School, Franciscan Life Communities has proved to be the perfect fit.



Crissie Frye, Ph.D. '76 ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR OF MANAGEMENT **EASTERN MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY**

A Spiritual Journey





rissie Frye, Ph.D '76 knows that Central Catholic High School prepared her well academically, but she believes the "life lessons" she learned there were equally important. An

associate professor of human resource management at Eastern Michigan University, Dr. Frye now imparts those same life lessons to her students.

Like Joe Rozanski, her social studies teacher at Central, who took his students to Toledo City Council meetings to see government in action, Dr. Frye's students at EMU work on team projects that take place in real businesses.

In a human resources course she teaches to juniors and seniors, for example, her students complete a comprehensive job analysis at area companies, including observing employees, creating job descriptions and ads, and writing situational and behavioral job interview questions.

And like her Central Catholic basketball coach, Fran Krompak, Dr. Frye believes in going the extra mile for her students.

"I didn't make the basketball team my freshman year, but Coach Krompak encouraged me to keep working and showed me how to develop my skills,"



said Dr. Frye, who made the team her sophomore year. "She helped me to understand how much teamwork, patience and discipline mean, which I carried over to other parts of my life."

Dr. Frye applied those skills as an undergraduate student at Bowling Green State University, and, later, while earning an MBA at the University of Northern Iowa and doctoral degree in human resources management from the University of Iowa. Dr. Frye and her husband raised two daughters, Kelli '97, and Shannon, '02, who also chose to attend Central Catholic.

One of Dr. Frye's best life lessons was having faculty and clergy encourage her to respect others and value and embrace diversity.

"Fr. Donnelly, who was the assistant principal while I was at Central Catholic was a strong influence for me and the other African American students," said Dr. Frye. "When I was at Central Catholic, there were only about 30 African American students in the entire school and it was easy to feel isolated."

"Fr. Donnelly reached out to us to make sure we felt included," she explained. While "diversity" wasn't a common term at the time, Fr. Donnelly promoted the concept in a number of ways. "He took us to Scott High School to see their gospel choir perform and then brought the choir to Central to perform at an assembly for the whole school to celebrate what was then known as "Negro History Week."

"Fr. Donnelly wanted everyone to see, experience, and value cultural differences," said Dr. Frye.

She takes the same level of interest in her work today as a mentor for the PhD Project, a program designed to encourage African-Americans, Hispanic-Americans and Native Americans to pursue doctoral studies in business. The number of minority business faculty has quadrupled since the program began in 1994. Dr. Frye is also a founding member of the Management Faculty of Color Association.

A lifelong Catholic, the spiritual aspect of Central Catholic had a lasting impact on Dr. Frye. "I will always remember the walk we made annually, as a school, to Rosary Cathedral right before Christmas break," said Dr. Frye. "For me, it more than just a walk to church; it was a spiritual journey."

"I really appreciated that all of the teachers and administrators at Central Catholic were willing to talk to me whenever I needed spiritual guidance," said Dr. Frye. "They guided me in my faith."

Paying it forward

er true love is teaching, so it is no surprise that so much of Peggyann Zaenger's life revolves around helping others to learn. Dr. Zaenger, '68, who retired from

St. Vincent's Medical Center Family Medicine Residency Program in Jacksonville, Florida in 2007, began her teaching career at the University of Toledo. She has yet to stop after 37 years. St. Vincent's will honor Dr. Zaenger this December by naming their new Family Practice Hospital Education Center in her honor.

Dr. Zaenger is the founding member of the "We Care" program, which provides medical services and products for the underprivileged in the Jacksonville area.

Her love of science and math, always a strong point in her life, intensified while she was a student at Central Catholic High School. "Sr. de Chantel really helped to develop my love of science," said Dr. Zaenger. She also credits Central Catholic with instilling in her strong organizational skills, a trait that served her well throughout her career, which often included 60-hour work weeks.

"I have always loved teaching," said Dr. Zaenger. "The part I enjoy the most is sharing information with pharmacy students and medical residents and watching them translate that information into better patient care."

Dr. Zaenger received her Bachelor's in Pharmacy from the University of Toledo's College of Pharmacy and her Doctor of Pharmacy degree from the University of Michigan. She began her career as an assistant professor of pharmacy and director of externships programs at UT.

"While I was at UT, I decided I wanted to explore some newer applications of science," said Dr. Zaenger. When an opportunity arose at the University of Florida's College of Pharmacy, she moved to Jacksonville to continue her career.



Dr. Zaenger was an associate professor at the University of Florida's College of Pharmacy and director of pharmacy for the Jacksonville Health Education Program. In 1990 she became the first woman in the history of the University of Florida's College of Pharmacy to be named a full professor.

Dr. Zaenger simultaneously taught physicians and students at St. Vincent's Family Medicine Center and Family Practice Residency Program in Jacksonville from 1980 to 2007.

Research has always been a passion of Dr. Zaenger's and over the course of her career, she has written 35 grants and authored 24 books and chapters. Several of her research projects centered on pivotal studies of new drugs. In order for a new drug to be approved by the Food and Drug Administration it must pass three pivotal, unique studies of sufficient size that ultimately prove that the drug works as well or better than the standard drug in its class.

Though officially retired, Dr. Zaenger still works two days a week. "I returned to my roots," she said. She is a practicing pharmacist at a professional independent compounding pharmacy.


Despite a heavy workload throughout her career, Dr. Zaenger has found time to travel the world several times, cantor at the Catholic church she attends, and play a pivotal role in many community projects.

"I was given a wonderful opportunity to have a great education," Dr. Zaenger explained. "I believe you have to pay it forward."

She is most proud of one particular pay-it-forward project, the North Florida School of Special Education, where she served as president of its board of directors. Dr. Zaenger helped to oversee a fundraising campaign to build the private school for children with mild to moderate intellectual disabilities.

Dr. Zaenger is also a founding member of the "We Care" program, which provides free medical services and products for the underprivileged in the Jacksonville area.

evin Buckley '73 knew in second grade that he wanted to attend Central Catholic High School. The oldest of seven children of Irish immigrants, Kevin said he was always impressed by the level of respect students received from their teachers at Central Catholic.

"They treated us as young adults," said Kevin. "They talked 'with us,' not 'at us."

His senior government teacher, Joe Rozanski, "always made the government classes very interesting," an approach that may have been a prelude to Kevin's decision to study law.

"I attribute much of my academic success at the University of Detroit (where he graduated magna cum laude) to the preparation I received at Central Catholic," said Kevin. He received his law degree from the University of Toledo College of Law in 1981.

Kevin began his professional career at Toledo Legal Aid Society, and worked in the juvenile, probate and municipal courts before being appointed a magistrate under Judge Jack Puffenberger. He was later named Chief Magistrate of the Lucas County Probate Court.

Magistrates, who serve at a judge's discretion, conduct proceedings which are then reviewed and adopted by a judge. Kevin handled cases in a number of areas, including estates, adoptions, name changes, competency hearings, and involuntary civil mental health commitments.

As one of the longest serving magistrates, Kevin has seen a number of changes in the courts, several of which have had a significant impact on the elderly and health care decisions.

"Elder Law and Elder Protection have really evolved and advanced over the last decade or two," said Kevin. "These changes were both needed and welcomed." Additional changes have included Advanced Directives such as Living Wills (the continuation or termination of life sustaining treatment) and Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care decisions.

Now retired from his magistrate position, Kevin has a private practice and deals primarily with probate cases.

Kevin is an active member of the Jersey Club, an alumni group of Fighting Irish Football players. The Jersey Club has been instrumental in providing funding for Central Catholic's football program needs, such as Victory Camp, team meals, and video and digital editing equipment.

One of Kevin's fondest memories of Central Catholic is a spiritual one involving the football team. "Before our games, we would have a Mass in the Chapel," he said. "We always sang *To Dream the Impossible Dream*. I can still hear all the young men's voices singing that song. It really moved us."



Carrying on the work of Christ.

hrist the Lord, as he traveled through Galilee and Judea, was often addressed by the title Rabbi (teacher), was asked to interpret the Law - both divine and civil - and was approached by the sick for healing. These three ministries are the

focus of the three classical professions: Teacher, Lawyer, and Doctor.

Gathering disciples to himself, Jesus instructed these initial 12, then 72, to go and preach the Good News by teaching, healing and the releasing from censures. These three tasks were then passed on to the next group of disciples, and so on through succeeding generations. So close was the connection between the clergy and religious of the Catholic Church with these three noble professions - teaching, judging and healing - that G.K. Chesterton once noted that "[Monasteries] kept the world's diary, faced the plagues of all flesh, taught the first technical arts, preserved the pagan literature, and above all, by a perpetual patchwork of charity, kept the poor from the most distant sight of their modern despair."

In the modern age, however, the idea of profession has expanded, thankfully, beyond the clerical state to include the work of the laity as well. When engaged with proper understanding, the work of lay professionals truly becomes a ministry - a carrying out of the triple munera of Christ himself, namely: teaching, governing and sanctifying. These duties Christ imparts upon all the Baptized when they are anointed following Baptism as Priest, Prophet and King. The work of the laity in the world is their special obligation in which God calls them to "seek the kingdom of God by engaging in temporal affairs and by ordering them according to the plan of God" (Lumen Gentium 31).



Specifically speaking, the challenge for you, as lay professionals, is the "penetrating and perfecting of the temporal order through the spirit of the Gospel" (Apostolicam Actuositatem 2). This is accomplished by allowing the Gospel of Christ to truly guide your daily actions. To teach as Christ taught, to judge rightly, and to heal compassionately. We cannot, however, neglect the newer professions which in their own way can bring about the work of Christ. Architects seek for beauty and order to be represented in building, in part, a bit of the Beauty and Unity which is God Himself. Social Workers, tending to the marginalized and neglected, continue the work of Christ who came to seek out and find the lost.

These are but a few examples of the many ways each of us, in our own profession, are called to carry on the work of Christ in our daily endeavors. May Christ the Lord of all professions keep you in His care and continue to inspire your actions.

National Signing Day at Central Catholic High School



Irish Boys Basketball Wins TRAC Title






Brown To Attend University of Notre Dame Summer Program
